2018 was the biggest year yet for Emgage and Emgage Action as we continued to witness incredible awakening of the Muslim American civic spirit. The year included our largest Get Out The Vote (GOTV) effort to date, where we engaged over 130,000 households and contributed to turning out the Muslim vote for the midterm elections. And the results could not have been any better, with Muslims voting at historical numbers in our core-GOTV states of Virginia, Michigan, Florida, and Ohio. Our cadre of staff and volunteers organized phone banks, distribute voter cards, and knocked on doors to ensure that our voices were heard loud and clear, and theu sure were. As shown in our Midterms Muslim Voter Report, Muslim Americans voted 25 percentage points higher in 2018 than they did in 2014. These results are proof that grassroots and data-driven organizing works. With the 2020 presidential elections just around the corner, we are more committed than ever to ensuring that Muslims vote at even higher numbers.

Emgage PAC also had a banner year. Beyond supporting the largest number of Muslim candidates ever, including Rashida Tlaib and Ilhan Omar, we helped elect another 136 of our endorsees to local, state, and national offices. Our endorsees included many first-time members of Congress who are now part of a growing number of lawmakers who share our values of protecting the rights and freedoms of all Americans.

Each year, Emgage Action sets its legislative priorities based on the most pressing concerns of our communities. Throughout the year, Emgage Action, along with our allies and supporters, tirelessly advocated for the passage of H.R.1730 and S.994, and educating the community about its benefits. In September, President Trump signed the Protecting Religiously Affiliated Institutions Act, mandating tougher punishment for those who threaten or attack houses of worship. We also defended human rights not just within our borders, but across the world. Emgage Action worked with Congress to pass \$.2060 and H.R.4223 to send a clear message to Burmese officials that their violence against the Rohingya is not without consequence. Going into 2019, we are working tirelessly to support family reunification at our border and addressing comprehensive immigration reform. We are also actively pushing lawmakers to address the human rights violations of the Uyghurs in China and supporting efforts to repeal the Muslim ban.

All of our accomplishments are only possible through you. It is because of your support, your donations, and your time that we thrive as both an organization and as a strong Muslim American voice. With your support, we will push for legislation that benefits our communities, elect leaders who stand up for us, and create a better future for our country.

Emgage In A Box





Within the Muslim community, civic engagement has become more important than ever. From rising Islamophobia to misguided policies that negatively impact our community, it is critical that Muslim Americans exercise their civic duty more fully. Muslim Americans have stepped up with higher numbers around voting, running for office, volunteering, and advocating for issues that impact their lives. In 2018, Emgage tracked over 100 Muslim candidates running for office! Although these trends are historic today, it is our goal to sustain this momentum and ensure that Muslim civic engagement becomes the norm in the United States.

Emgage in a Box provides a comprehensive overview of Emgage's organizing initiative that focuses on training community leaders and activists on how to develop and execute an efficient Get Out The Vote (GOTV) program for local, state, and federal elections.

The toolkit includes marketing materials and an in-depth manual, methods of communication, how to budget, managing logistics, and activity guidance.

GOTV is not a single activity but a coordinated effort of nonpartisan activities designed to maximize the impact of each citizen in order to mobilize an entire community. GOTV programs are based on the principles of community organizing, building relationships and engaging with neighbors to turn out voters in city, local and federal elections.

Emgage prides itself on voter mobilization efforts by utilizing a data driven approach to conduct surveys about the community's interests and to target where engagement on those issues could yield effective impact. With such data we utilize grassroots efforts such as voter registration campaigns, absentee ballot drives, candidate forums, statewide phone banking and canvassing, early voting events and distributing nonpartisan issue guides.

Emerging Leaders is our hallmark program and has been held in Texas for 5 consecutive years. Each year, a group of young Muslims are hand selected to go through three retreats to learn the ins and outs of political and civic engagement.

They learn what effective grassroots organizing looks like, complete leadership training, learn the life cycle of the legislative process and complete a service project which is usually international. They graduate as a cohort, a community within itself, ready, willing and able to create change in their respective communities.









2018 Midterm Muslim Voter Turnout

Emgage is proud to announce historic 2018 Midterm Elections results in the key states of Florida, Michigan, Ohio, and Virginia. According to data analysis of voter turnout in those states, Muslim Americans voted 25 points higher than they did in 2014.

We analyzed data from the NGP VAN database for the counties and congressional districts where Emgage focused its GOTV effort. As part of our study, we compared Muslim turnout data with previous midterm elections, including 2014 and 2010. For the purposes of data visualization, percentage were rounded to the nearest whole number. Emgage uses a proprietary name-match algorithm to identify likely registered Muslim voters in the NGP VAN database.






Muslim voter turnout increased 25 pts from 2014.

Emgage Gala

August 25th, 2018 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

The Emgage gala in Philadelphia gathered community members and leaders for an evening gala in August of last year. The event featured Ohio City Councilman Basheer Jones of Ward 7, Goldstar father Khizr Khan, and comedian and journalist Dean Obeidallah.



Bringing the change we need requires proactive and consistent civic participation. Engagement requires an understanding of the political process, how to engage with elected officials, and how to form partnerships with other constituencies in support of common policy positions.

Emgage Action is a 501c(4) that implements an ecosystem of programs to mobilize American Muslims to advocate and engage on issues with their public officials at the local, state, and federal levels that define who American Muslims are by what they stand for.

Emgage engages on these issues at the federal, state and local levels through organizing Hill Days, Capital Days and regularly connecting community members to lawmakers to discuss common sense solutions to some of our nation's biggest challenges.



2018 SCOTUS Muslim Ban Decision

Emgage Action joined over 80 organizations at the Supreme Court to rally and speak out against the ruling to uphold the Muslim Ban. Following the decision, community members were mobilized to "light up the Congressional Switchboards" and contact their representatives to speak out against the decision. With the Supreme Court's ruling, Emgage Action will continue its advocacy on the Hill to call Congress to repeal the ban.

House Resolution 257: Anti-Hate Crime Legislation Success

Combating hate crimes is a priority for Emgage Action and this resolution was agreed to in the House. Muslim Americans have experienced the fastest growth rate of hate crimes in recent years compared to any other group. This resolution encourages law enforcement officials to thoroughly investigate all hate-motivated crimes and it requests that the Department of Justice and other federal agencies improve the reporting of hate crimes.



Combating hate crimes is a priority for Emgage Action, through pressuring Congress to act and mobilizing the community to call and write to their officials, this resolution was agreed to in the House.

Senate Bill 994: Protecting Religiously Affiliated Instituations Legislative Success Senate Bill 994, Protecting Religiously Affiliated Institutions Act passed on September 4, 2018 and was signed into law on September 28, 2018. The United States is experiencing a rise in hate crimes and hate incidents against religious and ethnic minorities. This legislation amends the federal criminal code and increases the penalty for intentionally threatening or destroying religious real property.

Senate Bill 2060 and House Hill 5816, both referred to as the Burma Act, aimed to promote human rights in Burma through targeted sanctions against military officials who are found responsible for theethnic cleansing and serious human rights abuses of the Rohingya people.

With the legislative actions, meetings with officials, and advocacy on our Hill Day, Emgage Action was able to work within the coalition of Burma groups to successfully push these bills out of their committees.

The theme, Upholding our Values: A Commitment to Tolerance, highlighted the growing problem of discrimination against minorities at home and abroad. We advocated for three specific pieces of legislation: S. 2060/H.R 4223 (The Burma Act of 2017), S. 994/H.R. 1730 (Protecting Religiously Affiliated Institutions Act of 2017), and S. 1615/H.R. 3440 (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals and the DREAM Act).

The conference featured several distinguished guests who educated our audience on key issues that Emgage is advocating on. These include the crisis in Rohingya, and the rise of hate crimes in today's political climate.






