This year, Muslim Americans navigated one of the most difficult election cycles in recent memory. For many, the presidential ballot did not offer clarity or comfort. Instead, it raised difficult questions about how to remain true to our values while participating in a system that continues to fall short. At Emgage, we recognized the weight of that moment and stayed committed to supporting civic engagement, even when the path forward felt unclear.

And our community responded.

We saw people meet this moment with a sense of determination that did not come from ease, but from the understanding that stepping back was not an option. Muslim Americans didn't simply take part in the democratic process. They shaped it through efforts that felt both personal and grounded in care for one another. We witnessed this through conversations that unfolded at home and through organizing that continued in spaces where people already felt connected-masjids, student groups, neighborhood gatherings, and cultural centers that have long served as places of trust. From California and Texas to Michigan, Pennsylvania, and beyond, this work was visible across every state where Emgage has a chapter. In each of these places, people made it clear that our voices belong at the center of public life.

Emgage was there throughout this moment. We focused on helping voters cut through confusion and access the information they needed to make meaningful decisions. This year, we launched our largest Get Out the Vote (GOTV) campaign to date. We reached people directly—at the door, on the phone, and through conversations led by organizers who understood the communities they served. We placed a particular emphasis on local and down-ballot races, where decisions affect daily life and where turnout can shift what is possible. As the campaign unfolded, we saw people mobilize with growing confidence and a clear sense of purpose.

We also expanded opportunities for direct engagement with those in power. Emgage hosted forums and town halls that brought Muslim Americans into conversation with candidates and elected officials. These spaces created room for people to raise concerns that had been ignored and helped push public leaders to listen more closely and respond with care.

This year reminded us that civic engagement is not limited to election day. It is about remaining value-driven in the choices that define our future and continuing to show up when the stakes feel high and the outcomes uncertain. Emgage stayed focused on work that helps build a civic foundation that lasts.

Through our Emerging Leaders Program, we supported the next generation of Muslim Americans preparing to lead and create change in their communities. That same commitment to education shaped our Civic Engagement Series, where participants gained decisions are made and how to stay involved. At the same time,

the Muslim Civic Table brought together organizations and advocates to align strategy and focus on shared priorities. Each of these efforts reflected a simple goal: to keep our communities informed and ready to lead wherever decisions take shape.

That's why we partnered with the Institute for Social Policy and Understanding (ISPU) to produce research that gave voice to Muslim voters in key states. The findings confirmed what we already knew from our work across the country. Our community's vote is decisive, and our demands are rooted in justice. The data made it clear that we cannot be taken for granted and that our priorities must be part of the national conversation.

The year ahead will bring new challenges, but Emgage is ready. We are grounded in the foundation we have built and we are guided by the strength of our diverse community. Whether we are advocating for our rights here at home or standing for human rights abroad, we remain focused on the work ahead. Systems alone do not deliver justice. People do. And our community continues to lead with purpose.





In 2024, Emgage generated 6.82K earned media hits. The earned media coverage reached a potential audience of 34.5 billion. 

Million Muslim Votes

We re-launched the Million Muslim Votes campaign for the 2024 elections to continue building Muslim voter power across the country.

In 2020, the campaign helped drive a historic turnout, with 1,087,086 registered Muslim voters casting ballots in 12 target states. For 2024, the campaign sought to expand reach and deep engagement in key states, including California, New York, and Arizona.

The campaign has focused on turning out voters in elections at all levels, and currently includes national partners such as MPAC, along with over 70 state and local grassroots organizations.

The Muslim American community is an indelible part of the fabric of this country. We are a powerful voting and social bloc, and it is crucial that we all participate in our democracy to keep it strong and vibrant.

Surrounded by passionate community leaders, organizers, and advocates, we came together not just to celebrate our progress but to energize one another for the work ahead.

The atmosphere was electric—conversations were filled with hope, determination, and a shared vision for a future where Muslim voices shape the political landscape.

Guests engaged in meaningful discussions about the power of our vote, the urgent

issues facing

our communities, and the importance of mobilizing every eligible voter.

Building on the success of 2020, where we made history with record-breaking Muslim voter turnout, this event reaffirmed our commitment to going even bigger in 2024. From the powerful speeches to the heartfelt personal stories shared, every moment underscored why our voices—and our votes—matter more than ever.



Honoring the Legacy of Black Muslims

Emgage proudly hosted its fifth annual Honoring the Legacy of Black Muslims Town Hall, a powerful Black History Month gathering that celebrated the enduring contributions of Black Muslims to American life. From shaping civil rights policy and advancing equity in government to leading in neuroscience and community healing, Black Muslims have long stood at the forefront of progress.

This year's event featured five extraordinary leaders—Dr. Alia Ammar, Mayor Nadia Mohamed, Raheemah Abdulaleem, Rep. Lateefah Simon, and Dr. Quaiser Abdullah—who shared personal reflections on their journeys and the legacy they carry forward. From the courtroom to Congress, from classrooms to city halls, their stories underscored the vital role of Black Muslims in shaping a more just and inclusive America. As we honor the past, we also look to the future—one where Black Muslim leadership continues to drive change across every sector of society.





Emgage hosted our first Black History Month Breakfast on the Hill, featuring Rahmah Abdulaleem, Executive Director of Soulful Muslims, and Congressman Maxwell Frost. This inspiring gathering honored the rich legacy of Black leadership, resilience, and contributions within the Muslim community, fostering meaningful dialogue on unity, diversity, and the path forward.



Data to Power: Elevating Muslim Voices in the 2024 Election



In 2024, we helped conduct a groundbreaking study that reshaped the political conversation and highlighted the power of Muslim voters in influencing the nation's future.

This pivotal research, conducted by Emgage in partnership with te for Social Policy and

the Institute for Social Policy and Understanding (ISPU) and Change Research, culminated in the report "Winning Muslim Votes: A Policy Priority Analysis in Swing States." It provided critical insights into the issues that mattered most to Muslim communities as the nation prepared for the 2024 elections.

The findings of the report revealed urgent concerns among Muslim voters in key swing states such as Georgia, Pennsylvania, and Michigan. The violence in Gaza and the pervasive issue of Islamophobia emerged as top priorities. These results were not mere statistics—they became a rallying cry that shaped candidate platforms and mobilized our community to demand action.

1 The Shift in Support for Biden



The study revealed a dramatic shift in voter sentiment, which influenced how candidates approached our community:


Only 18%
of Muslims who supported Biden in 2020 planned to vote
for him again in 2024 before his withdrawal, reflecting a
substantial decline in support.



This data underscored the importance of earning Muslim support. It became clear to all lawmakers that Muslim voters could not be taken for granted.

The War in Gaza: The Defining Issue

The violence in Gaza was the dominant concern among Muslim voters and catalyzed widespread engagement:

voting—the significance was
even more pronounced.



We used its findings to engage with political leaders, advocate for policy changes, and ensure that the voices of Muslim voters were not only heard but respected. The report also inspired grassroots mobilization within our community, empowering Muslim voters to make informed decisions and solidify their role as a decisive demographic in one of the most consequential elections in history.

Through this effort, we demonstrated the undeniable influence of Muslim voters and underscored the need for political leaders to address our community's priorities.

This pivotal work reshaped political engagement and left a lasting impact on the electoral process.







